Economic and Political Causes of Genocidal Violence: A ...

The UN Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of Genocide defines genocide as 'acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or part a national, ethnical, racial or religious group' Genocide is different from civil war: it usually involves deaths on a much larger scale
